HOW TO USE THIS MANUAL

This journal contains 52 curated questions specifically intended to help you think about leadership and the related areas of performance, success, and decision-making. Each question is followed by blank space for you to respond to the question's prompt. There is no right or wrong way to do this. Some of you may decide to write down the first instinct and idea that comes to your mind after reading the prompt. Others of you will go more slowly and contemplate your response. Whichever way you decide to approach it is up to you. The point is for you to set aside time in your day to seriously contemplate leadership and in so doing you will be working toward developing the habits of mind that lead toward your thinking about leadership.

Practicing leadership, becoming a leader, and even learning to think like a leader each required intentionality. Not everyone is a leader in the sense that they are the "boss." Leadership can occur without having formal title or organizational authority. Not everyone is a leader! But everyone can practice leadership more effectively. This journal is not about making you a leader, per se. It is about helping you realize and reflect on the leaders in your life, reflect on the times that you practiced leadership and overcame adversity, reflect on what your ship looks like from your perspective.

These 52 reflection questions are intended to be taken once a week. This way you have a bite sized plan for integrating leadership and thinking into your routine.
